Age 25, of Hookstown, in Beaver County, Pennsylvania, Died November 27, 2018


Serving During Operation Freedom's Sentinel

that occurred in Afghanistan




U.S. Marine Sgt. Benjamin S. Hines


Christopher Slutman bravely wore two uniforms. He was a New York City Firefighter and a member of the United States Marine Corps.




U.S. Navy Ensign Sarah Mitchell

in the Red Sea.



U.S. Army PFC Joshua Mikeasky

Age 19 from Johnstown, Pennsylvania, Died December 13, 2018

PFC Mikeasky died at Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan, from a non-combat related incident. Mikeasky was assigned to the 4th Battalion, 31st Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division from Fort Drum in New York.

Major Wiegand, a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy,
was killed in a night flight training accident on March 30, 2019.
